College Level Advanced Placement Courses:

AP Literature & Comp, AP Language & Comp, AP Macroeconomics, AP US History, AP European History/AP World History, AP Art History, AP Psychology, AP Govt & Politics, AP Calculus (AB), AP Statistics, AP Biology, AP Chemistry, AP Physics (C), AP Environmental Science, and AP Human Geography.

AP Biology, AP Physics and AP Chemistry meets six hours or more per six day cycle. AP Environmental and AP Calculus AB meets five hours per six day cycle.

The Internship Program offers students an opportunity to gain on-the-job experience in areas of career interest. Fall, Spring and Summer courses earn a half credit.

Iroquois Academy of Business Program allows our students internships, workplace experience and the opportunity to earn college credit.

Career & Technical programs are enhanced by a wide variety of two year courses at separate occupational centers serving juniors and seniors.

Erie 1 BOCES New Visions Program allows seniors intensive study in Legal, Health or Zoo Wildlife careers.

OUR VISION

THE SCHOOL DISTRICT/COMMUNITY

The Iroquois Central School District embraces approximately 84 square miles within the Towns of Elma, Marilla, Wales, Aurora, Lancaster and Bennington. We offer an unique blend of suburban/rural living which combines residential and agricultural areas. It is located approximately fourteen miles southeast of Buffalo in Erie County. The district has a population of 22,000 with a limited industrial base.

HIGH SCHOOL

Iroquois High School is a highly regarded educational institution serving approximately 752 students enrolled in grades 9-12. The school boasts a strong, expert faculty and comprehensive curriculum. Art, music and athletic programs maintain high enrollments and afford students the opportunity to perform outside the classroom. In addition, the business and technology programs provide students with the opportunity to gain real world experience. Approximately 87% of all graduates move on to higher education.

GRADING

All grades are numerical and unweighted. The determination of final grades is done by using 1/5 the final examination and 4/5 of the quarterly grades. The ELA benchmark is not included in the English 11R final average. Beginning January 2019, the ELA exam score, will be included in the final average. A final grade of 65 is the minimum passing grade. All students take final exams where they are offered, unless they have an exempt status.

When computing rank in class, Advanced Placement courses are weighted at 1.05 and are the only weighted courses. All courses for which numerical grades are given are included whether passed or failed (excluding Physical Education). All students who expect to graduate, regardless of program, are included in the ranking.

The valedictorian and salutatorian are selected at the end of the 30 week marking period of their senior year.
